

Are there subsidies for energy storage projects in Serbia

How much does a solar project cost in Serbia?

Second, on 14 June 2023, the MoE published the first-ever public call for auctions to award the right to market premiums for 400 MW of wind and 50 MW of solar projects in Serbia. Bids are to be submitted by 14 August 2023. The maximum offered price is EUR 105/MWh for wind projects and EUR 90/MWh for solar projects.

How much solar power will Serbia produce in a year?

Only through strategic partnership and auctions (if successfully implemented) is Serbia expected to reach a capacity of more than 2.3 GW of new solar and wind power production facilities in the years ahead. Additionally, there are many projects developing on a commercial basis that do not count on incentives.

Who will build a self-balancing solar power plant in Serbia?

First, on 4 May 2023, the Government of Serbia initiated the procedure for selecting a strategic partner for the construction of 1 GW of self-balancing solar power plants to be owned and operated by the state-owned power utility EPS a.d. Beograd. The public call is expected to be published in the early summer of this year.

How does a market premium agreement work in Serbia?

Upon the submission of a guarantee, the investor signs a Market Premium Agreement with the authorised contracting party (i.e. guaranteed electricity supplier), while the template is drafted by the Serbian government.

What incentives are retained for RES energy production?

The previously existing incentives (feed-in tariffs) for production of electric energy from RES are retained only for small plants (i.e. power plants with a capacity below 500 kW and below 3 MW for wind power plants) and demonstration projects.

What incentives are available for a zero-subsidy project?

To encourage further investment in the sector and as a steppingstone towards fully market-driven and zero-subsidy projects, the Law provides for two incentive systems: a market premium; and a feed-in tariff for some small projects.

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Serbia narrowly missed its 2020 renewable energy target of 27 per cent of gross final energy consumption - in 2020 its share was 26.3 per cent. By the end of 2023, Serbia had 511 MW of wind power installed but only 42 MW of solar. In 2021 a new Law on Renewable Energy was approved, which moves Serbia to a market-based support scheme.

Under the law, the prosumer has the right to produce electricity for self-consumption, store electricity, and to deliver electricity surpluses to the grid in order to sell it. For the surplus electricity fed into the grid, prosumers are ...

On 20 April 2021, the National Assembly of the Republic of Serbia adopted four energy laws, including the long-awaited Law on Use of Renewable Energy Sources.

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The EU non-refundable grant will add to Serbian budget to ensure that the SMEs can continue benefitting from stable energy price. Thanks to this, during 2023 at least the same number of SMEs as in 2022 (70.000 companies) will benefit from the EU support, and this number may be increased by November 2023. In practice, the protected SME will benefit from a price cap.

Hydro energy and wind power dominate RES projects in Serbia, although there has been a very significant increase in installed prosumer PV capacities recently. The Government of Serbia has also started to implement ambitious plans to install multiple gigawatts (GWs) of RES capacities in wind and solar (PV) energy in the country.

Spain is targeting 20GW of new energy storage by 2030. MITECO also launched a similarly-sized grant scheme specifically for co-located or hybridised energy storage projects, for which proposals were due in March 2023. Enel Green Power submitted two projects during the first quarter which fit the criteria, totalling 60MWh and 38MWh respectively.

There is a separate Decree on Defining Conditions for Approving Incentives in Attracting Direct Investments in the Production of Food Products also approved in January 2019 and amended in May 2023 with similar incentives: for investment projects valued at EUR50-100 million, subsidies are limited to 25% of the total investment, falling to 17% ...
