How much electricity does an RV use?

It's simple math, indeed. An average RV uses 20 kWh electricity per day, which accumulates to 600 kWh in one month. The national average price of electricity in the USA is 12 cents per kWh, which makes the monthly bill \$75. This consumption rate and cost may vary from RV to RV, depending on various factors.
